Franklin in Portraits: Benjamin West

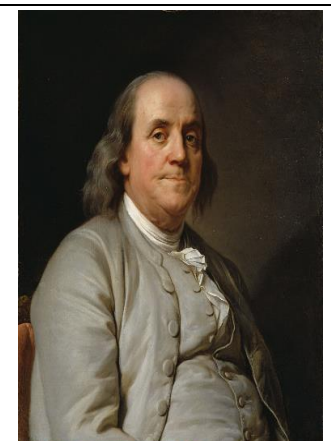


Ben's Digital Book Club: White Fury by Christer Petley

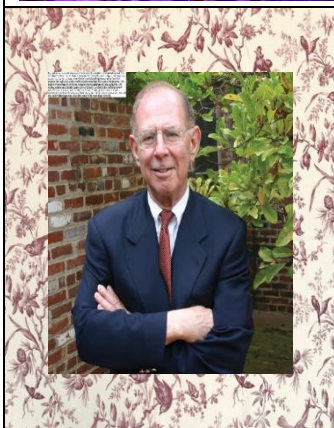

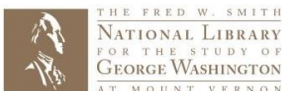

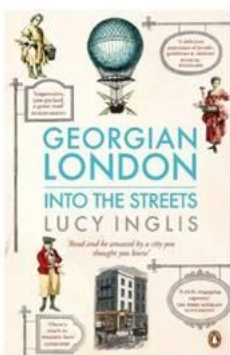

Celebrate our virtual exhibition, Franklin in Portraits, a series of talks on portrayals of Benjamin Franklin in art.

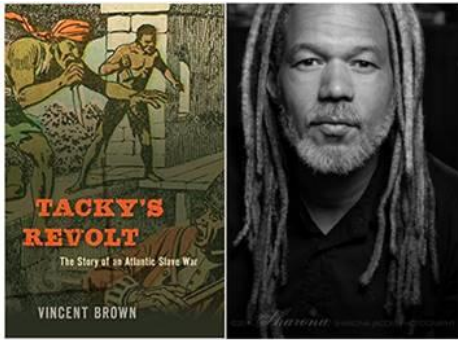
Dr George Boudreau was in conversation with Professor Zara Anishanslin, Fellow at the Davis Center for Historical Studies at Princeton University, on the earliest known Franklin portrait by Robert Feke created circa 1738-1746. This lesser known portrait in the collection of the Harvard Art Museums marks Franklin's transition from tradesman printer to prosperous gentleman; Dr. Anishanslin discussed the significance of this early Franklin image and it's connection to 18th century portraiture. **Watch [here](#)**

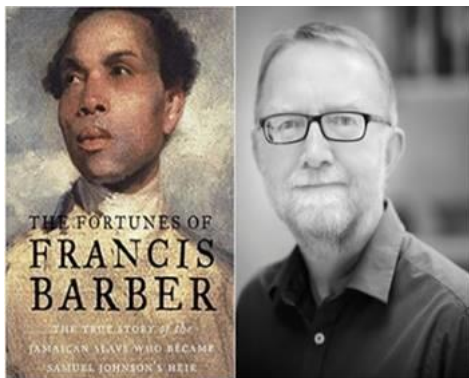
